Our achievements also demonstrate that as a Navajo enterprise we continue to meet and exceed expectations; therefore, we consider our accomplishments as the Navajo Nation's success.

As we celebrate our 60th Anniversary this year we will dedicate ourselves to continue to move NTUA forward towards another year of progress. We look forward to working closely with you on projects that will benefit the Navajo people.

he Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) was created on January 22, 1959 to develop the utility infrastructure on the Navajo Nation. Since then NTUA has grown into a self-sustaining. non-profit, successful tribally -owned enterprise, delivering communication services, electricity, natural gas, renewable energy, waste water services, and water throughout a 27,000 square mile service territory. Following the values of teamwork and respect, NTUA employees are dedicated to extend and provide multi-utility services across northern Arizona, northwestern New Mexico and southeastern Utah. In Navajo, the phrase "Niandeiilnish" means "We work for You". To uphold that principle, NTUA works for the Navajo People. That's been our commitment since 1959.

Kayenta Solar Facility expands in 2018



n June 2017, the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority and its subsidiary NGI-Kayenta, Inc., made history, introducing the first-ever utility scale renewable energy farm on the Navajo Nation. In 2018 a decision was made to expand the facility, increasing its output capacity, reviving jobs, and boosting the Navajo economy. Groundbreaking festivities were held in August 2018; a job fair was held in November 2018; and early construction work began in December 2018. At the one-day job fair 585 individuals showed up to submit an application of which 160 had worked on Kayenta I (phase one).

We anticipate Kayenta II (phase two) will repeat Kayenta I success, such as multi-million construction tax payments to the Navajo Nation and generating an estimated \$15 million in economic activity to the region. The facility is set to be completed by June 2019. All the Electricity generated by the facility remains and will remain on Navajo, feeding two NTUA substations and distributing to communities served by NTUA. This wholly owned Navajo project, demonstrates that the Navajo Nation is ready for large scale renewable energy production.


Cameron Community votes for Solar

The biggest challenge to develop solar facility projects is finding available land on the Navajo Nation. NTUA has met with several communities interested in the possibility; however, when the topic turned to land, the prospects became

more challenging. Fortunately, the Cameron community understood the benefits of a large scale solar project, especially in the area of employment. After three months of consideration, Chapter members approved the resolution and paved the way

for a large scale solar facility. When complete, it will be larger than the Kayenta Solar Project. The resolution approves land use for up to 5,000 acres. The project is now in the environmental surveys and rights of way process.

NTUA Scholarships: Opportunities for Higher Education

ach year, NTUA awards scholarships and internships to Navajo students pursuing higher education in studies related to the multi-service utility industry. In 2018, NTUA awarded \$154,500 in college scholarships awarded to 73 students for the 2018-2019 academic year. The awardees primarily attended state universities in Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, and Colorado, including Navajo Technical University and Dine' College. The standard award is \$2,000 distributed over two semesters, while the enhanced award is \$2,500 and includes a paid summer internship with NTUA. All 73 students are enrolled in Bachelor's

Degree programs -- including engineering, information technology, finance/accounting, environmental science; business administration and management. Over an 11-year period, NTUA has awarded 702 scholarships totaling \$1,102,950. In 2018 NTUA employed 22 student interns and placed them

at job sites throughout the company. The interns represented academic fields such as Architecture, Engineering (Biomedical, Civil, Electrical, Technology, Environmental, General and Mechanical), Business Administration, Computer Information Systems, Entrepreneurship, and Environmental Science.

NTUA helps build and support the Navajo Nation by Paying Taxes

he NTUA objectives are to help improve the health and welfare of the residents of the Navajo Nation and to promote employment opportunities on the Navajo Nation. As a non-profit tribal enterprise, NTUA adheres to the Navajo Procurement/Purchasing Preference which cultivates a positive economic impact to the Navajo Nation. As an example, NTUA mandates that material and equipment be delivered to locations on the Navajo Nation so that the applicable Navajo Nation Sales Tax is paid on material and equipment. NTUA submits payment for Navajo Nation taxes every quarter based on revenues which are generated on the Navajo Nation - thus 5% Navajo Nation Tax or the applicable Certified Chapter/

Shiprock Water/Wastewater Treatment Plant to receive over \$20 million

TUA received great news at the end of 2018. A project that's been on the planning board for years got a major boost. New Mexico U.S. Senators Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich announced \$35.4 million in funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development to build and improve rural water and wastewater systems in New Mexico. The Shiprock Water Treatment plant made the list. The project will receive \$20,795,000 in loans and \$5,250,315 in grants to build a new wastewater delivery and treatment plant which is expected to serve more than 6,000 residents.

The Shiprock Wastewater Treatment Plant was built in 1959 and had exceeded its life expectancy of 60 years. The new facility will improve public health and allow future development with the Navajo Gallup Water Line Project which is proposed to run through Shiprock. The facility will also improve environmental health. the facility maintains a high level of efficiency which will provide clean discharge into the San Juan River. The grant awards were funded through the USDA's Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant program, and will help ensure clean water for Tribal lands, and rural communities with 10,000 or fewer residents in New Mexico.

Reaching out to meet with Customers



hroughout 2018, NTUA
District representatives met
with communities to provide
updates on utility projects and to
improve our relationship with our
customers. The Chapter Community Outreach presentations also
encouraged questions and provided answers. The districts have
a rotating 3-4 year schedule and
were able to visit 88 of the 110
Navajo Nation chapters. Overall,
NTUA attended 122 meetings in
2018.

NTUA works with NN Division of **General Services to improve Internet** Service for Tribal offices

TUA and the Navajo Nation Division of General Services formed a partnership to significantly improve the internet/broadband services for tribal offices throughout the Navajo Nation. The agreement will improve the primary problem Navajo Nation offices experience the lack of broadband bandwidth and its transport. The aim was to take advantage of what is readily available - in this case - direct access to the vast fiber optic broadband network built and operated by NTUA. This is why NTUA invested into building the fiber optic network in 2013.

We knew that a broadband network would be needed to meet the growing technology needs of the Navajo Nation. This agreement is two-fold; providing better internet service and saving the NN money. The agreement will allow the Navajo Nation Department of Information Technology (NNDIT services to unite governmental offices across the Nation through technology because there will be enough bandwidth to offer additional internet, Video conferencing services, and VOIP (low-cost telephone services over internet). Under the new agreement, the Navajo Nation

Division of General Services will purchase bulk broadband from NTUA, allowing internal government offices to upgrade internet services, including public safety, fire department and chapter houses. This NTUA's first major broadband agreement with the Navajo Nation.

triving to build a better quality of life for the Navajo people, NTUA and our cellular communications sister Choice NTUA Wireless are working together to build quality broadband (Internet Access and Ethernet) access to communication services for Navajo Nation Schools, Government offices,

Hospitals, E911 Emergency Services and Enterprises on the Nation. In 2018, NTUA and NTUAW began construction on an internet/fiber line build for the Apache County School District, starting from Red Mesa to Cove/Red Valley to Round Rock and ending at Sanders. This project will inter-connect this school district to help educators teach our children. In addition, we will continue to plan, design and seek creative opportunities to bring connective to rural underserved and unserved areas of our region.

Electric Crews connect over 5,000 homes since 2008

n 2018 NTUA electric cónstruction crews throughout the service territory connected 335 families to the electric grid. It was a slight decrease from 2017 where 409 additional families were added to the electric grid. The number of projects each year depends on funding.

Since 2008, NTUA electric crews have connected 5.213 homes to the electric grid. On the average that's about 521 homes per year. Some years had as many as 782 homes connected while other years there were only 256 homes. Each project carries with a funding formula – which may include Navajo chapter funds, the

Navajo Nation, and State or Federal agencies. NTUA also contributes \$1,500 to connect each home. Since 2008, the non-profit tribal enterprise put \$7,819,500 of its own funds to connect over 5,000 homes. Today there are about 15,000 Navajo homes w/o electricity.

NTUA and NTUAW Complete Internet Pilot Project with Microsoft and NTU as Partners

n early 2018, NTUA implemented a multi-agency Pilot Project at five Navajo Nation Chapter Houses to establish and demonstrate the many benefits of broadband connectivity. A Pilot Project evolved into a multiple partner project that included NTUA, Choice NTUA Wireless (NTU-AW), Navajo Technical University (NTU), and Microsoft. By the end of 2018 Kinlichee, Fort Defiance, Chinle, Mexican Water, and Shiprock chapter houses received free computer training and free internet. The primary purpose of the pilot project was to help chapters better understand and witness the many potential benefits of broadband connectivity, including giving community members free ac-

cess to the internet in a safe environment. The Pilot Project began with NTUA covering the expense for installation, and Choice NTUA Wireless providing the Internet access. The project then expanded gaining support from Microsoft and Navajo Technical University. Microsoft supported the community broadband concept and donated \$100,000 for computer equipment for the five chapters and provided basic computer training for community residents. NTU agreed to assist with further develop computer training and technical support by working closely with the chapter administrations. The project will also serve as a foundation to strengthen the educational background of NTU computer

technology students. This project is an example of NTUA's and NTUA Wireless' commitment to expand the network to reach underserved and unserved areas of the Nation and working with local communities to educate, understand and utilize broadband is the goal, and to stimulate competition to improve services, including seeking partnerships with outside companies and corporations. The success of the pilot project has provided NTUA with information as to how communities are familiar with, utilize, and plan for Internet access, thereby establishing a plan to propose an internet broadband extension to 55 chapters with the help of the Navajo Nation.

Choice NTUA Wireless multiplies Internet connections

hoice NTUA Wireless (NTUAW) was established in 2013 to provide and improve mobile and internet connections for the region. A new wireless company created another "choice" in the telecommunications network and forced competitors to upgrade services sold to the Navajo people. It worked. Today the Navajo Nation has a "choice" in wireless communications providers. Something more positive happened in

2018. NTUAW offered a new internet service called SPLASH – which was a substantial improvement over what was available. Word of mouth has increased the numbers. Satisfied customers shared their SPLASH experience. Businesses included. NTUAW witnessed an increase in business customers which helped businesses expand business opportunities. high schools.

High School Sportsmanship Awards

he objective of the NTUA Sportsmanship Award is to support education and to promote sportsmanship. We encourage student athletes to be role models on and off the court, equally balancing academics and athletics. Selections are based on teacher/coach nominations. Students must maintain a high grade point average and demonstrate integrity in their schools and communities. The awards are presented at regional and district playoffs before thousands of Navajo Nation basketball fans. NTUA districts continue to spell out the meaning of Sportsmanship by honoring regional athletes during the district and regional basketball playoffs. In 2017, NTUA and Choice NTUA Wireless presented certificates and sports bags to 95 students attending regional high schools.

NTUA Lineman Team proudly represents Navajo Nation at National Event

TUA sent a team of electric linemen to a lineman rodeo Lineman Rodeo competition in Lawrenceburg, Indiana in the fall of 2018. There were 27 teams represented by 176 electric linemen. Most of

the teams were from the east coast, with three teams west of the Mississippi – two teams from California and one team from the Navajo Nation. The NTUA team, which had been invited, demonstrated skill and knowledge to place in three events.

Our team earned 2nd place in hurt man rescue, 2nd place in cross-arm change out, and 1st place energized dead-end bell change out. It's the first time the NTUA team outperformed and brought home top honors.




2018 Year End Utility Construction Projects






